Every team member dedicated their time and resources and had been preparing and doing rehearsals to get the maximum output to succeed in the event. Each group leader worked tirelessly.



Being in the audience, I wondered what a critical and important responsibility it must be to be holding that position and manage everything to precision. I remember asking myself whether I would ever have what it takes to hold that position and perform those duties. She communicated all the important information of the District throughout the year to the district officers.

Four years down the line, here I am holding that position. The question I had in my mind in 2016 was long gone when I received the call from the incoming district leadership in April 2020.

It has been six months as Administrative Manager of District 82 and it has been a very enjoyable journey so far. What I saw the Administrative Manager do in 2016 at the DOTP, I did it!! Listening skills, conflict resolution, ability to filter information, ability to choose what to say and what not to say, ability to speak up when it is required, maintaining a positive attitude at all times, importance of giving prompt and professional feedback, ability to absorb negative feedback, taking ownership for mistakes made and ability to draw the line between what I should be doing and what I should let others do are some of the skills that I am experiencing with this leadership position. 

My first leadership experience at Toastmasters was as a Sub Committee leader at the installation ceremony. This role resulted in personal growth and confidence that I now see as transformative, in my leadership progression.

Inspiration

There were many obstacles due to inadequate membership and commitment from existing members; therefore, club leadership could have given up the challenge easily. Frequent communications were done through veteran Toastmasters in Siyane family, which would assist them to stay in touch without giving up the challenge. We had to wait patiently by providing frequent advice to members of Minuwangoda Toastmasters club, believing "There will be a light at the end of the tunnel".

Peer Support

The journey towards excellence would not have been a reality without the extreme support from Siyane family members. They were behind me from the day this seed was planted until it became a plant, nurturing it all the way through.

I always believe that precise planning will resolve 80% of the problem, which will lead to a smooth execution to conquer the journey to reach any dream destination.
